Course Objectives: The aim of the course is to provide students with basic information about the history of interior

design starting from the Renaissance to the present.

Course Description:

The course focuses on interior and furniture designs since Renaissance. The first part of the course deals with a modernization process from the Renaissance and Baroque periods to De Stijl. Here, concepts such as establishment of discipline in design, change in housing design, standardization and rationalization will be discussed. In the second half of the course, the design theories and activities that emerged and influenced in the second half of the 20th century starting from Bauhaus will be examined.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Understanding that human and environmental conditions vary according to geographical location and affect design and construction decisions.
- Gain awareness of the basic context and framework of history as it relates
- Understanding the basic context and framework of history, based on interior design
- Understanding interior design styles and movements
- Understanding the social, political and physical influences that have affected from historical changes in the design of the built environment.
