| COURSE INFORMATION | | | |
| Course Description | This is an 8-week course designed for B1-level ESL students who wish to develop their English proficiency in all four language skills. It is intended for learners who have an understanding of English and want to enhance their communication, reading, listening and writing abilities in both academic and everyday settings. It teaches students to understand and produce more complex language structures, expand their vocabulary, engage in meaningful conversations with increased fluency and confidence, analyze a variety of texts and audios and develop students' critical thinking and problem-solving skills through discussion-based activities, and writing and project tasks. Our teaching approach emphasizes student-centered learning, communicative language teaching, and task-based activities. Students will practice identifying main ideas and details, summarizing, expressing and evaluating opinions with arguments, and writing essays on academic and everyday areas. Students who successfully complete B1 Level will move on to the B2 level and have the right to take the Proficiency Exam held after the second and fourth modules. | | |



Reading: By the end of the module, learners will be able to:

- identify the main idea in texts of moderate to advanced complexity, including articles, narratives, and opinion pieces.
- analyze text organization and structure, such as cause-effect and problem-solution relationships, comparison, and sequencing.
- determine arguments and viewpoints in texts, supporting writer's own opinions and reasoning.

Course Objectives

Listening: By the end of the module, learners will be able to:

- take concise notes using symbols, abbreviations, and relevant details from a lecture or conversation.
- recognize the topic, main ideas, and keywords in monologues, dialogues, or lectures.
- identify specific details, examples, numbers, and dates, and the organization of a talk or lecture using speech markers on familiar and academic topics.
- identify cause-effect and problem-solution relationships, make comparisons, and connect problems to their respective solutions in structured discussions
- interpret speaker's purpose in a conversation or presentation.

Writing: By the end of the module, learners will be able to:

- write structured essays to express their opinions clearly using complex sentences with appropriate connectors and markers on familiar or academic topics, providing logical reasons, examples, and evidence to support their views.
- edit and revise written work for clarity, coherence, and grammatical accuracy.

Speaking: By the end of the module, learners will be able to:

- use unit related vocabulary and complex grammatical structures accurately and appropriately.
- share detailed opinions on familiar and academic topics in a short presentation or monologue
- participate actively in discussions about various topics by asking and responding to detailed questions, clarifying, and providing elaboration.
- give presentations on familiar and academic topics
