Political Behavior and the Emotional Citizen:
Participation and Reaction in Turkey

Scholarly literature on the determinants of citizen political behavior in the Turkish context has been limited and primarily descriptive. This project offers a behavioral perspective to the Turkish public through one of the fast growing domains of research across the disciplines, emotions. The multi-disciplinary interest on emotions has grown rapidly over the last two decades. Understanding how emotions generate and influence attitudes, preferences, and judgments is now a critical question scholars aim to explore in political science, psychology, decision-making, and neurosciences. From the standpoint of emotions, this project discusses how anger, fear, and enthusiasm promote distinct effects on political preferences, political participation, and vote choice over the last couple of years in the context of Turkey.

Cengiz Erişen received his PhD in Political Science from Stony Brook University (2009). He is currently an associate professor in the Department of Political Science at TOBB University of Economics and Technology. His research interests include comparative political behavior, political psychology, public opinion analysis and quantitative methods. His previous work has appeared in Political Psychology, Journal of Common Market Studies, Political Research Quarterly, American Politics Research, Turkish Studies, Contemporary Politics, and Southeast European and the Black Sea Studies. He is the co-editor of the forthcoming book (with Paul Kubicek), Democratic Consolidation in Turkey: Micro and Macro Challenges, to be published in June 2016 by Routledge.
