SEMINAR IN GLOBAL POLITICS AND INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Spring 2023

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course aims to provide guidance for students at the stage of writing their master's thesis. It also aims to help graduate students explore their research interests, develop these ideas into a consistent and systematic research agenda. First, the course instructor will provide a general overview of research design elements. Thereafter, students are expected to submit their first thesis proposal draft in the midterm week.

Course instructor will provide detailed feedback on each and every step of the proposal-writing. Participants are expected to present their proposal and submit a second draft in the end of the semester. Being a seminar, POLS 707 requires very active involvement of the students. Upon the successful completion of this course; the students will be able to write a well-founded proposal for their own research.

*IMPORTANT NOTE: THIS SEMINAR IS DESIGNED TO PROVIDE GUIDANCE IN THE EARLY STAGE OF THESIS-WRITING PROCESS. THE FINAL DECISION ON YOUR PROPOSAL'S SHAPE AND CONTENT WILL BE GIVEN BY YOUR THESIS SUPERVISOR.

COURSE STRUCTURE:

This course gathers in a bi-weekly schedule, 5-6 times throughout the semester. Students are required to read the necessary material, do the assignments and be prepared to discuss them before every gathering. Course gathering schedule is provided below.

The course is designed in a manner the participants get feedback not only from the instructor but also from their peers. Therefore, students are assigned as eachother's discussants for particular assignments. This course should be considered as an important early stage of the MA thesis process. By the end of the semester, students are supposed to have a clear idea about their thesis-writing pathways and general topic of their master's thesis.

COURSE POLICIES:

- ANNOUNCEMENT POLICY: All information regarding the course will either be announced in class or be sent to your ABU e-mail address. Check your e-mail regularly. It is your responsibility to beware the information announced through e-mail.

- Your performance in the in-class interaction tasks.
- Quality of the proposal and early stages of it (assignments).
 - Clarity of the research question.
 - Quality of the literature review.
 - Clarity of the methodology.
 - Originality of the research.
- Your responsiveness to the feedback.
- Your proposal presentation.
 - There will be a presentation session in the end of the semester. Professors from POLS department as well as other MA students will join this session. You are all required to present your research proposal in this session and you will receive feedback from the professors and general audience.
