Course Objectives: Provide an understanding of the principles of interior design and shape a basic knowledge about the professional practice with its relation to other design disciplines

Course Description: This course introduces a general perception related to the fundamentals of interior architecture/design by focusing on different dimensions of the profession. By shifting from a macro scale to an interior space, interior architect candidates will learn professional terminologies. The aim of this course is to introduce students the fundamentals of interior architecture.

Learning Outcomes: **Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:**

- Expand knowledge about the profession of interior design and its relation with other design disciplines
- Understand the need for competence and skills to collaborate effectively across multiple disciplines when developing design solutions.
- Understand the breadth and depth of influence and value of interior designer in the society
- Be conscious about the process of developing an interior architecture design project.

The studio classes and discussions will be in English. Developing your verbal language skills will be very important in acquiring disciplinary terminology as well as daily communication in the class.

Planned Learning Activities and Teaching Method:

Learning/Teaching Method: The expected learning outcomes for the course will be assessed through: lectures, group presentations, a Midterm Project, Final Project and Class discussions and feedback.
